Have you ever tried to fix something that was broken? Did you succeed? How difficult was it? Did you have to go buy parts, or did you have what you needed around the house?

Fixing broken things can be challenging, but there is great reward and satisfaction in succeeding. How about this one, though: Have you ever tried to fix a broken person? That's a challenge many orders of magnitude more difficult than fixing a broken thing. With things, while the fix may not be easy, at least they don't resist your efforts to make them better. The problems of a broken person may not only be hard to identify, but the person may actively hide some of them for one of a plethora of sometimes inscrutable reasons. What's more, the person may not even want to be fixed, again, for reasons that may not be rational by any reasonable measure.

In order to fix a person, you have to be willing to make a long-term investment; to go on a journey that may stretch on for years without any obvious hope of a finite end point. You'll need to be prepared to bear with setbacks that leave you half a step from throwing in the towel, throwing up your hands, and giving up altogether. There will likely be joys and great moments of success along the way, but there will also be frustrations of equal magnitude. And this is all just for fixing a single person.

What might it take to fix a whole world of them? That's a task you and I could never manage, but which our faithful God committed Himself to in full when He wrapped Himself in human flesh and came to earth as a helpless baby just over 2,000 years ago. The neighborhood of our world was broken nearly beyond repair, but God moved in and set about transforming it with the power of His Gospel. We are heirs to that transformational power today. We are not merely heirs, though, but conduits through which God intends to keep it rolling forward, ever-expanding its reach and scope.

At Christmas, this coming-to-earth of the Savior of the world to transform it into the kind of place fit for its true and righteous king is exactly what we celebrate. We celebrate and commit ourselves afresh to being a part of the process. God moved into the neighborhood, and the world has never been the same. Amidst the hustle and bustle that will threaten to steal your heart this season, pause from time to time to reflect on this great truth: Jesus came to earth as a baby to transform it; to transform you. Pause and let yourself be made new. Let yourself be transformed. And be here on Sundays through Christmas as we talk about how this all works in our new teaching series, God Moved into the Neighborhood.

Who Was Lottie Moon?

Charlotte "Lottie" Digges Moon was born in Albemarle County, Virginia, on December 12, 1849. Her parents were affluent Baptist parents Anna Maria Barclay and Edward Harris Moon. Lottie's mom would read her many stories of missionaries telling people about Jesus. One day, Lottie said, "I want to be God's helper."

She boarded a train, then a boat, then a shentze (a cart lined with straw and instead of wheels - 2 mules). Along her way to China, she spent time learning Chinese and befriended many of the children. She would bake cookies and share Bible stories with all the children.

One day, Lottie wrote a letter to women in America, and it said "I need someone to help me. Could you send two more missionaries? Ask the women to save their money and give it at Christmastime." Renamed the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions in 1918, it has since raised an amount that averages more than \$20 million annually.
