COMMUNICATION



How do we as humans communicate? When we think of this topic of communication, we usually think of the words we speak toward each other. This topic has always intrigued me. It is what I studied in my undergraduate degree and something I read about often. But as of a few days ago, life has forced me to rethink the issue in a way that literally took

my breath away. As a lot of you know already, the student lock-in this past weekend had one casualty, my voice. I went to sleep the night afterward feeling okay, but the next morning for church, I woke up with a vivid case of laryngitis. I then came to church wondering how in the world I was going to do announcements and teach children's church. Luckily, there were awesome people like my wife Marisa and Pastor Jonathan who were able to cover for me.

But after we went home after church, I began to think about the implications of this ailment plaguing me. I am, by craft, a pastor. A pastor, by craft, makes his living by using his mouth to communicate God's Word to the church. I then wondered how in the next few days I would talk to people in the daily responsibilities of ministry. After working through that idea personally, a more profound thought hit me. What if this condition became permanent? How would I then minister without a voice? What would I do? Marisa eventually quelled these fears with logical rationale, something I was not exhibiting at the time. But my mind continued to wander to those whose condition is permanent: those who are deaf or mute and do not communicate vocally. I thought of Ephesians 4:29 which states "Let no corrupt talk come out of your mouths, but only such as is good for building up." How can someone who cannot talk follow this verse, and what does this idea have to do with us who have fully-functioning voice boxes?

You see, in our communication as humans, only 15% of it is verbal; 85% of the communication we encounter is non-verbal communication. From body language, to written word, to how we say a word, even all the way down to how close we stand to a person, how we smell, or what type of accent we have, all these things are non-verbal communication. We make inferences and derive messages from each. So then, with this in mind, does Ephesians 4:29 only apply to the 15% of our communication? That is, to that which is verbal? Another verse might give us some clarity. Psalm 19:14 says "Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight, O Lord, my rock and my redeemer." You see the connection between these two ideas of the heart and the mouth. Just like verbal communication, non-verbal communication is connected to our hearts as much as verbal is. This is something to consider if 85% of our communication is non-verbal. The challenge then becomes as Christians, is our walk, aka non-verbal actions, matching what we are saying, aka our verbal actions? Do we use sarcasm in our tone more often than not? Is our body posture

one that communicates judgement rather than love? Do the ways we intentionally walk past someone without even recognizing them give off the vibe of haughtiness? The list could go on and on. And even all these could be up for interpretation if they are sinful or not. But what is the standard to measure the, by? What causes evil or good in both verbal and non-verbal communication? The heart. And only you and God can see yours.

So, from a person who lately has been forced to focus more on the non-verbal side of communication, take a moment and ask yourself: How's your communication? Verbal AND Non-verbal? Is it filled with love flowing from a redeemed heart? Is there something that you could confess to God and ask for help with?

Communication, the way we convey ideas to one another, will always be valuable to God, both verbal and nonverbal; both what we say and how we say it; walking the walk and talking the talk.

may be turned in through the offering in an envelope marked "poinsettia."


Boxed Offering Envelopes





December 8, 2019


at 6:00 p.m.

A Christmas reception for everyone will follow!




