

The apostle Paul's letter to the believers in the region of Galatia is largely about the freedom we have in Christ that the Law of Moses simply didn't afford the ancient Israelites. After several chapters' worth of build-up, he finally lands at the beginning of chapter 5 on this magnificent statement: "For freedom, Christ has set us free. Stand firm then and don't submit again to a yoke of slavery." Christ has set us free from sin and the law

for the purpose of our being able to enjoy the freedom He has given us. Receiving this incredible freedom requires that we entrust our lives fully into His hands, of course; but other than that, there aren't any strings attached to this gift. It is given simply for us to enjoy. The important question, remains, though: How can we live as free people?

As our nation celebrates the truly unique gift of freedom we have as citizens of the United States of America, we find ourselves living in a day when it is an increasingly open question just how free of a nation we really are or even should be. When laws are being passed and changed with greater frequency, and our people are increasingly divided along hyper-partisan lines, what claim to freedom do we really have anymore?

Yet both sides of the aisle are too often and easily losing sight of what freedom really is—at least, the kind of freedom that is worth having. Both the right and the left are growing more comfortable turning to the state as the chief guarantor of our freedom. We want laws that specify the things we can and cannot do. We want laws that specify what the people around us can and cannot do as well. The trouble with this is that instead of living by freedom, we are more and more living by law. Living by law is not freedom. At least, it's not freedom according to guys like Paul.

But even if you run away from the idea of freedom determined by legislation toward some sort of more libertarian view of freedom being best secured by a government that stays out of the way so that we can be our own masters, you're still not on target with the freedom Paul called us to in Christ.

Contrary to so many folks today, freedom is not something any law can guarantee. It is also not something we can claim for ourselves. In fact, one of the most subtle forms of slavery is the slavery of being responsible for ourselves. I've been reading a book recently called, *You Are Not Your Own*, by Alan Noble. It is absolutely worth your time to get a copy and

read it for yourself, but his thesis is that our culture's great commitment to our being responsible for ourselves is leading to nothing but pain and destruction in our lives.

God made us for something greater. He made us to be His. When we are willing to embrace not being responsible for ourselves, but instead of belonging entirely to God, all of a sudden, a whole world of pressure and expectation is liftedentirely from our shoulders and cannot be put back on us unless we allow it. The freest we will ever be is when we are entirely committed body, mind, and soul to Christ. Then we will be able to become fully who we were designed to be to His great glory and our great joy. Then we will not have to concern ourselves with maintaining some identity because our identity will be firmly established in Him. Then we will not have to fear someone taking our freedom from us, because it will be safely held by one who cannot be conquered.

So, this season, as you celebrate your freedom, celebrate it best by committing yourself fully in obedience to Christ and His kingdom, where the only law is the law of love. Live free in Him and show the world what it has always been seeking.
