Evangelism is a scary word. It shouldn't be for all kinds of reasons. We were commanded to do it. Jesus promised to help us when we do it. It's just telling people about Jesus. It involves sharing what should be one of the single most powerful experiences with the Creator of the universe we've ever had. It should be easy. And fun. And what every conscientious good Christian looks forward to doing all the time with all of the unbelievers about us.

But it's not. Except for the few extroverts among us who happen to be blessed with the spiritual gift of evangelism, if we're really being honest, it's a terrifying thought. We might be rejected. We might be asked a question we can't answer. We might be made fun of. We could lose a relationship. On and on and on our litany of excuses...er...reasons goes. If I can offer an observation, though, it seems that evangelism is a scary thought not because of the act of sharing the Gospel itself, but because of how we've been trained to think about it.

If you are someone who has been around the church for more than 30 years, you were raised with a particular vision of evangelism. This was a rather formal vision in which you sat down with an unbeliever and went through some sort of specific conversation in which you shared a handful of spiritual truths and Scriptures that you had memorized in advance. Then, once all of this was finished, you asked if they wanted to pray to accept Jesus into their heart, they said, "Yes" (because you did such a great job presenting the Gospel to them), you prayed the Sinner's Prayer with them, and, congratulations, you had successfully shared the Gospel.

And the real trouble with this image is that the church then unleashed charismatic men and women who were gifted evangelists who criss-crossed the country sharing story after incredible story of how they had done this very thing over and over again to great effect. Personal ministries rose up around folks who created and perfected methods of evangelism that conscientious Christians wanting to be faithful paid good money to learn from conferences and books and group study series. And, yes, a handful of these folks discovered they had the gift of evangelism as well. But for the rest of us...it mostly left us feeling badly that we never once had a Gospel encounter like we kept hearing about. We'd ask that one question that was supposed to turn the whole conversation in the direction of Jesus and the other person didn't bite. And nothing happened. Or maybe we inadvertently pushed an unbelieving friend too hard and instead of making a Christian, we lost a friend. And so evangelism became in our minds something that was, honestly, scary and dangerous.

But what if we've been thinking about it all wrong? And I don't just mean there is yet another evangelism method that's finally going to be the one that will work and make it easy for us. There will always be new evangelism methods being created in an effort to convince Christians that sharing their faith is

something they really can do. One of the latest is the Three Circles Method and it's great. But it may not work for you...meaning you're not better off in your thinking than you were before.

What if instead of worrying about doing evangelism or sharing your faith or even proclaiming the Gospel, you just gave your attention to having Gospel conversations. These don't ever have to be forced. In fact, they shouldn't be forced. Forced conversations never changed a single mind or heart. But if you have a personal conversation with someone with whom you already have a relationship, and that conversation begins to drift near a topic about which the Gospel has something to say (which is a pretty broad category), do you think you could express why and how Jesus has made a difference in your life in that particular area? Or, could you be honest enough with them to express how even though you aren't there yet, you're finding that letting Jesus help is getting you further toward the goal of righteousness than you have gotten on your own?

The truth here is that if we are going to advance God's kingdom and be faithful to the task Jesus has given us (not to mention growing and strengthening the church), sharing the Gospel is going to be a central part of the task (along with prayer, engaging with the Scriptures, and staying vitally connected with the church). But this doesn't have to be something scary or intimidating. It simply involves having Gospel conversations with the people around you.

As we get into this Fall season, I suspect that many of you will have the opportunity to engage with some folks who aren't currently following Jesus. Some of these folks will be people you know and interact with on a regular basis. You are going to be having conversations about all kinds of things with them and some of those things will be things to which the Gospel speaks. Let it. Let it speak through you. Don't force it. Don't worry about questions you can't answer. Don't worry about being rejected. Just share honestly why the Gospel has made a difference for you in relation to that issue. Plant a seed. Then watch and see how the Spirit makes it grow. You'll be glad you did. And so will they. Let us together be the church God designed us to be—one that reaches out to advance God's kingdom by having Gospel conversations in the world around us.
