

# Happy New Year!

Here we are at the cusp of something new once again. A new year as it so happens this time. The calendar has turned, and there is a sense of anticipation in the air. Anticipation for what exactly isn't ever terribly clear but standing at the cusp of new things always feels just a bit exciting. And scary. Sometimes more scary than exciting, but in most circumstances a healthy mixture of both.

As for the question of where we go from here, there are a number of different factors that all play a role in helping

us arrive at an answer.

For starters, sometimes the things that determine our direction are factors not only completely outside of our control, but also entirely unknowable standing where we currently are. Easily the best example of this is Covid. As 2018 became 2019, the plans we had for the year ahead included several different things, all of which were completely turned on their heads as it became clear that Covid was going to be an entirely more disruptive thing to our lives than anyone anticipated on that New Year's Day.

Sometimes the deciding vote goes to something God does. We may start off in some direction, but God moves in some way that is clearly pushing us in another direction. These kinds of interactions are even harder to predict and are things we just have to roll with when they arrive.

There's one more pretty significant factor here worth mentioning. This is the question of the kind of church we want to be. What is the end toward which we are aiming? It is this element that, save a direct intervention from God Himself, has the most to do with where we are to go from here. Or, to put that in a way that sounds a bit pithier, the direction is determined by the destination.

Let me see if an example helps to clarify what I mean here, and then I want to ponder some questions together. If you are going on a trip, the direction you go is determined by the destination toward which you are aiming. For instance, if you are going to Disney World, heading north on I-85 is likely not what you are going to be doing. Your destination is to the south and so your direction will reflect that.

Given all of this, as a church, what is our destination? It's easy to answer that question by saying something about our heading toward God's kingdom. Many churches settle for something along those lines. And that's not necessarily a bad thing. It's certainly a true thing. But as we have talked about before, it's not all that helpful of a thing. The reason for this is that every church is technically headed in that direction. Something so generic as this doesn't give us enough details to differentiate our path from that of any other church.

So, what else is there?

Well, there's our mission statement as a church. First Baptist Oakboro is a people with whom anyone can connect to grow in Christ and reach out for His kingdom. That gives us a great deal more clarity on the direction we need to go from here. We need to be actively doing those things which help people connect here both with our community and with our mutual heavenly Father. We need to make sure we are creating opportunities for people to grow in their relationship with Jesus and then actively encouraging them to take those opportunities. We need to create pathways for our people to reach out for the sake of advancing Christ's kingdom which will take the form of a more active engagement in missions both local and non-local. All of these are going to be a part of our direction because otherwise we aren't being faithful to the identity

Allow me to offer one more observation of something which should arguably have somewhat of a determining role in our direction: our community. We live in a growing community. And, a great deal of that growth is coming in the form of young families. Some of these are coming in already committed to a church somewhere else. Some don't really have a church but are interested in one. Some have never really considered such a thing before. Some families are small. Some are larger. Some are multi-generational. There are all kinds of families making the decision to invest at least a season of their lives in our town because of all it has to offer them. We need to be part of what it has to offer them.

How do we do this? For starters, by continuing to be the genuinely welcoming-to-new-people community we already are. People love that about us. They should. It's part of what makes us so special. But there's more. If younger families are moving to the area, we need to make sure we have an active kids and youth ministry ready to receive them when they arrive. Nate and a terrific team of volunteers are already hard at work on this, but they always need more people who love kids and want to see them become more fully who Jesus designed them to be. Families want to be in a place their kids are going to be embraced. That fact should determine our direction. One more: Our worship service has to be a point of connection. The worship service is a vital time in the life of our community. It should be. It is for us. It also has to be accessible to folks who aren't yet a part of our community. It must itself be invitational. What does this look like in practice? That's a conversation worth having together.

This coming year, I am excited about the potential to see more people connect with the Gospel and the kingdom of God because of what Jesus does through us, His body. I already know of another outdoor baptism service that will be coming up this spring. Kids camps are set. Folks are already looking forward to this year's Trunk or Treat. The community is growing. Let's be a part of God's action to advance His kingdom in this community and beyond together.
