



I think I've spoken before about the fact that I have been slowly studying my way through the Exodus narrative in my personal devotion time. Going into this season I was excited about the first part of the story and less enthused about the second. Once you get through the Ten Commandments at Mount Sinai, other than the hysterically and tragically funny story about the golden calf episode, the rest of the narrative is a

collection of ancient laws that rarely seem relevant to us, a description of how the Israelites were to build the tabernacle, and a description of how the Israelites built the tabernacle according to those instructions.

In other words...it's kind of boring.

At least at first glance.

Yet as is demonstrated to be true about the Scriptures over and over again, when we take time to mine their riches, we will find treasure. And when we mine veins that we have not explored very deeply before, we'll often be surprised at just how much treasure we will find.

Exodus 25 opens with God's instructions to Moses to collect an offering from everyone who was willing to donate the supplies needed to build the tabernacle. The idea of God's people coming together to give generously and sacrificially to build physical structures that will serve an important purpose in not only their worship, but also in God's larger efforts to reveal Himself to the people around His people who are not yet a part of His people so that they might become His people is a very old and well-established one indeed.

More on that sometime later.

In any event, after making a call for an offering, God tells the people why He wants them to do this. "They are to make a sanctuary for me so that I may dwell among them." This was the purpose of the tabernacle: so that God had a place to dwell among the people of Israel.

Now, did God need a physical place to dwell? Of course not. He's God. He's Spirit. He can go anywhere He pleases. The last thing in the world He needs is a finite, physical place to live. But Israel needed it. They needed the reassurance that God was among them. They needed something they could wrap their minds and by that their hearts around to understand that God was with them. And that's exactly what God wanted

them to understand: that He was with them. That He was among them to dwell with them. That they were in His presence. He wanted them to, over time, develop the conscious thought that where they were, God was.

This was to serve as a motivating force for their words and actions. More than that, though, it was to shape the way they thought about themselves. It was to be the primary factor forming their identity. Where they were, God was.

This was a good system for a long time, but it was never made to be permanent. God always intended to fulfill this first covenant and replace it with an even greater one wherein His presence could be with us—in us—even more fully than He was with Israel. With Israel, although they were to think of themselves as the people of God, they never could quite get past thinking about God's presence as limited to the temple. Under the new covenant and with the revelation of His Spirit in the wake of Jesus' ministry, death, & resurrection, God's presence became officially mobile. Paul told us that we, His followers, are the temple of the Holy Spirit who dwells in us. In other words, anywhere we go, there God is.

But Paul was never talking about believers individually. He was always talking primarily about the church. Where the church is, God is. We are the place where God dwells. And He dwells in us and among us and through us for a very specific reason. He wants to grow His kingdom so that even more people can come to know Him and love Him (for indeed, to know Him is to love Him since He is love).

Let that idea sit on your heart and mind for a bit. The church is the place where God dwells. Where a church is, is a place where the people around that church can experience the presence of God through His people as we take the light of the Gospel and the presence of the Spirit with us everywhere we go. If you want to think about it in these terms, we are all lamps, and the church is the place we go—the community with whom we gather—to fill our reservoirs and trim our wicks so we can shine all the more brightly. To put it even more directly: Where we are, God is.

But God is never content to just sit in one place. He is a mobile God, and He is on the move. He is moving through us into the community around us. Our job in this is to make sure we are going with Him, but also to make sure that we have the capacity to receive and minister to the people He draws to Himself through us so they can experience His presence where He dwells—in us, His people.

This is a high and noble calling. It is one we are pursuing together, one step at a time. We are pursuing the calling of proclaiming the Gospel and making disciples so that God's presence in us might grow and expand to change the world, starting with Oakboro.

Be ready. We're going to take an important step in this direction in the days ahead of us. It will take all of us being courageously faithful and sacrificially generous together. The end goal, though, is nothing short than the expansion of God's kingdom to His glory, our joy, and the transformation of our community. Be praying now about how He is calling you to be a part of it. I can't wait to experience what He is doing together.


