When a train gets going at full speed, it is an incredibly powerful force. It is a force powerful enough that it fascinates us. Countless movies have been made involving a train wreck in some form or fashion. You can even find lists ranking them in order from best to worst. One I remember from growing up was the climactic ending of the movie Silver Streak, a comedy/action thriller from 1976, starring Gene Wilder and Richard Pryor. That crash was really well done. The expression "like a train wreck" refers

to a situation that has gone horribly wrong, but from which we can't divert our attention. Such raw power begs to be observed.

A train going at full speed, though, won't stay there forever. Physics works against such a thing. As soon as the power driving the train forward goes out, the seemingly unstoppable force immediately begins slowing down, its kinetic energy gradually being converted back into mere potential energy. Now, depending on just how much kinetic energy has been unleashed, it may take a long time and a long stretch of track, but without that engine pumping, its end has already been determined. The only questions are when and where it will stop, not whether.

In the same sort of way, an organization that gets up and running at full speed can be an extraordinarily powerful force. When an organization really hits its stride, it can feel like nothing can stand in its way. Yet the law of institutional inertia works in much the same way as physical inertia does. Everything will continue in the same direction at the same speed unless acted upon by an outside force. Unfortunately, the world is full of outside forces that will slow things down to a crawl, and eventually to a full halt.

I have been telling you in this space for months that God is up to something big at First Baptist Oakboro. The momentum was building and building, and I kept telling you that we were right around the corner from it all being unleashed in a powerful explosion of kingdom advancement.

Then we started into a new calendar year at the start of school this past August and the explosion arrived. I don't say that to pat ourselves on the back, but merely to report what God has done. If you don't believe me, just look around. Go back and watch the recordings of the service over the last year paying attention only to the children's sermon each week. Pay attention to just how many kids are down front. That kind of thing doesn't happen without God's empowering it.

As we talked about this past Sunday, we are seeing new members officially join each month. First-time guests are an almost weekly affair. We are baptizing regularly (three times since August). The Gathering Place really is the hottest

John Wesley is credited by saying, "Whatever cools my affection towards Christ is of the World."

In 2025, let's not blend into the world...let us impact it by being visual and verbal reflections of Christ to the world... and that begins with rhythms that spur Christlikeness.



ticket in Oakboro on Wednesday nights. I remember a service a few weeks ago when things felt like they always did in the room until suddenly it felt like there were people everywhere. You could hardly move to get around the room there were so many here. I wasn't alone in noticing that either. And to repeat the point, there are kids and youth everywhere these days. At our last Gathering Place of the year there were more than 50 kids and youth on campus, and that wasn't everybody. (And when you consider that there were just 108 here for dinner, that means we were almost outnumbered.)

As we move together into this new year, there are few places better to be as a church than right where we are. This is good. It is exciting! There are few things as fun as being a part of a growing and active church. Everything just feels right. There's a kind of buzz in the air. You get the sense that you are part of something significant. You are where God is moving.

There's just one caveat to all of this. It is absolutely imperative that we not lose sight of the fact that none of this is happening because of us. Yes, we have done much of the practical work. You have been the awesome church you are, which has resulted in the creation of this incredibly attractive community that is drawing people in from out of the woodwork. But we didn't do any of it on our own. Where a church gets big, people can do that. Where a church is actively advancing God's kingdom, only God's power allows for that to happen.

If we want to settle for being a big church, we can, but it won't last, and it won't accomplish anything of significance in the long run. If we want to be a kingdom-advancing church, though, we've got to stay tapped into God's power.

That takes three things in particular. It takes our being intentionally committed to prayer, which is the surest way to access that power. It takes our being intentionally committed to the Scriptures which will make sure we stay on the right track. And it will take our being intentionally committed to being the church. That is, we have to make sure we are staying faithful to the reason for our existence—to advance God's kingdom by proclaiming the Gospel message of Christ's death, resurrection, and the salvation available in Him because of it. As long as we keep doing that, we'll never run out of power. And as long as our engine keeps humming along, we'll keep speeding on down the tracks toward God's kingdom.

Let's keep advancing His kingdom together in this new year!


