


Once a month, I meet with a small group of pastors in the area to pray. Recently we've added a couple of things to the agenda. One is lunch. Given that we're a bunch of Baptist pastors, that really shouldn't surprise anyone. The other is studying the Scriptures together. Basically, I'm regularly doing with them what I tell you to be doing with the church.

The particular guide we are using for our Scripture studying is a little booklet that has the text of 1-2 Timothy and Titus on one page, and a blank, lined sheet for note taking on the other. We're just going through the book one page at a time.

Paul's letters to Timothy are intensely practical guides for church leaders to help them pursue their task wisely, winsomely, and well. This past week, I was reading 1 Timothy 1:12-20. There Paul is marveling about his own call in Christ to the ministry of the Gospel. He says something starting in v. 15 that I've read before, and that Paul says in other places as well.

Here's what he says: "The saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the foremost."

Now, this is one of those things Paul says that makes us roll our eyes just a bit...and cringe inwardly with guilt. If Paul, the super-apostle, was the foremost of sinners, then what does that make us? I completely understand that sentiment, but that's not what I want to focus on right now. Instead, let's keep going with Paul in v. 16: "But I received mercy for this reason, that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display his perfect patience as an example to those who were to believe in him for eternal life. To the King of the ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen."

What I want you to see here is that even after several years' worth of really successful ministry by both worldly and kingdom standards, Paul had not lost the wonder of his salvation. He had not lost sight of the fact that, as he wrote to the Ephesian believers, it was by grace he was saved through faith, and this was not of himself. It was the gift of Jesus Christ such that he could not boast in himself. He could only boast in his God (which he did as often as he could).

Here's the connection point that struck me for us as a church. We've got a lot of good things going on right now. I highlighted several of those with you last month, and since then, all the numbers I gave you have only

increased. I know the tornado threat impacted this to make it an anomaly, but we actually had 41 more people at The Gathering Place two weeks ago than we did in worship. And the kids. So. Many. Kids. By many external measures, we are doing really, really well as a church. If you are as excited about that as I am, that's a good and right thing to feel. We should be celebrating that.

But let's make sure we are celebrating the right thing.

Let us make sure we are celebrating the incredible, faithful work of our God through us. In one sense, yes, we have had everything to do with the success we are enjoying. We are the ones showing up. We are the ones fixing the meals. We are the ones teaching the lessons. We are the ones leading the ministries. We are the ones keeping the nursery. On and on it goes. But in a much greater, more important sense, we don't have anything to do with any of the success we are experiencing. Lots of other churches are doing those same sorts of things and yet they are slowly dying. Instead of trying to figure out where to put all of the kids and youth they are seeing, they are trying to figure out how to keep the lights on and the pastor employed.

Our faithful God is doing a work. He is doing it for reasons of His own that are all grace from start to finish. He is doing it in response to our praying together. He is doing it in response to faithfulness. But He is doing it. Not us. What we are is stewards. He is doing the work, He is putting the work in our hands, and it is our job to steward it, to manage it faithfully and well.

This means we have to keep serving faithfully. We have to keep serving selflessly. We have to keep serving generously. We have to keep serving sacrificially. We have to keep serving joyfully (there are few things as off-putting to guests as a grumpy servant). We have to keep going above and beyond just like our God is. We do all of this in spite of the fact that we are just a small community of imperfect people. We do it so that "Jesus Christ might display his perfect patience as an example to those who [are] to believe in him for eternal life."

Let me give you one more reason we do it, and this is the most important of all: Jesus rose from the grave. Our God defeated death, opened the doors to eternal life in His kingdom, and then gave us the keys of that kingdom. The only proper response to this on our part is to keep those doors thrown open wide so that everyone He puts within our sphere of influence hears about it so they can receive it as well.

Living for the Lord involves being in a right relationship with both our Heavenly Father and our fellow man:

[34] But when the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered themselves together. [35] One of them, a lawyer, asked Him a question, testing Him, [36] "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?" [37] And He said to him, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' [38] "This is the great and foremost commandment. [39] "The second is like it, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.'

Gary Chapman in his book "The Five Languages of Apology" shares simply what apology should look like.

First, apology has an expression of regret: I am sorry.


Second, it contains an admission of guilt: I was wrong.

Third, apology offers restitution: What can I do to make it right?

Fourth, apology involves genuine repentance: Committing to really trying with all of our hearts not to do that offense again.

Fifth and last, apology requests forgiveness... Will you forgive me?

How about us? Are we practicing true apology?




## **HOPE Fellowship Happenings**
