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Happy Mother's Day



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I started pastoring in 2008, just before Noah was born. One of the theological/pastoral interests I've had since leaving the starting blocks in ministry has been apologetics. That word comes from the Greek word apologia, which means to offer a verbal defense of something. Essentially, apologetics is the intellectual discipline of being able to offer a verbal defense of the Christian faith. To put that another way, it is developing the ability to explain to someone else not only why you believe, but

why they should believe too. More than even that, it is about defending the Christian faith both negatively, in terms of countering arguments against it, and positively, in terms of giving sound arguments in favor of it.

Getting started in ministry when I did put me squarely in one of the great heydays of Chrisitan apologetics. In the wake of 9/11 less than a decade earlier, there was a great reaction to that world-changing event against all forms of organized religion, but especially against Christianity. Just two years before I started pastoring, when I was still in seminary, famous atheist, Richard Dawkins, published his magnum opus against the Christian faith, The God Delusion. It had an enormous cultural impact. It was at the front edge of a wave of secularism that swept through Western culture like a tidal wave.

In many ways it hit a church that was completely unprepared for it. Many believers thought there was going to be a great turning toward the church in the wake of 9/11 since all the churches were filled to capacity in those first few weeks after the attack. But then the momentum shifted entirely in the other direction.

We started hearing agonizing reports about the rapid rise of the "nones," a group of people who were ostensibly secular in their outlook. Many prominent atheists found themselves in high demand, making lots of money on books and speaking events, and cheered endlessly on the Internet which was also starting to really hit its stride with the release of the first iPhone in 2008.

Year after year the number of people claiming to have no religious identification or commitment rose. Churches saw their membership rolls ebb. The culture around us underwent an incredible secularization. Things that were once assumed were now forgotten and hated where they still existed. The culture began wholeheartedly embracing every progressive moral project that came along. The reaction against the traditional Christian morality that had characterized the moral imagination of our nation for decades was erased almost overnight.

The church's days were numbered, or so every gloating secularist you met on the street or on an Internet comment thread declared with glee. And, as far as what many believers could see, they were right.

But then something began to happen. The tide began to shift again.

This is a pretty recent shift, and demographers and sociologists are still trying to assess just how comprehensive it is and what it means, but the numbers are growing

harder and harder to ignore. Whereas the Millennial Generation and older members of Generation Z largely didn't want anything to do with the church or organized religion more generally, preferring instead a full-throated embrace of secularism, younger members of Generation Z and older members of Generation Alpha are trending hard in the other direction.

If you look for it, you'll fairly easily find more and more reports about people flooding back into churches across the world, but especially in the cultural West. This is especially pronounced in Europe right now, but it's happening here as well. Young people are hungry for something more substantial than secularism was able to offer. They have seen the emptiness of friends and family members who bought into secularism's canard, and don't want that. They have seen the results of the hard, incredibly intolerant morality of modern secularism and are searching eagerly for a tradition with structure, but more grace to it. They want real hope and the assurance that forgiveness is possible when they blow it.

Christianity offers all of this and more. And so they're coming. Some of them are coming back, but more of them are coming for the first time. To a certain degree, it is an act of rebellion against the previous generation, which means that in another generation, we'll likely see things shift back the other way again, but in the meantime, we are sitting at the front end of an incredible opportunity.

So, what's it going to take to capitalize on what lies ahead of us? Well, much of what we are already doing. Continuing to offer a solid, loving, Gospel-centered community will be a huge attraction point for young families looking to experience something real, and to see their kids raised in an environment that gives them a strong, moral, grace-filled foundation. It will take worshiping together with unity to keep our focus solely on Christ and advancing His kingdom. It will take lots and lots and lots of prayer. It will take serving eagerly and actively.

When you are in the church, you need to think like an owner, not a renter. This thing is yours, and if you don't actively invest in it and take care of it, it won't last. This means that folks who are further along on their journey with Jesus need to be active in pouring into those who aren't as far along. This can mean moving intentionally into teaching roles, yes, but it can also mean simply building good relationships where casual mentoring & discipling are happening on a regular basis.

What the church cannot be is simply a social setting even though it is certainly not less than that. It is a Gospel community where we can connect, grow, and reach out to expand God's kingdom alongside a group of people who are committed to doing the same with us. And if that sounds familiar, it should. God has made this church to be a people with whom anyone can connect to grow in Christ and reach out for His kingdom. We need to be ourselves—the selves God made us to be together. When we do that, we'll continue to see His kingdom grow. We'll continue to see disciples who make disciples made.

That's the goal. I can't wait to pursue even more of it with you in the days ahead of us!

- 1. I will not think about this incident.
- 2. I will not talk about this incident with anyone.
- 3. I will not bring this incident up and use it against you.
- 4. I will not allow this incident to come between us.
- 5. I will ask God what He is trying to teach me.

Demonstrates hatred

[21] "You have heard that the ancients were told, 'You shall not commit murder' and 'Whoever commits murder shall be liable to the court.' [22] "But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother shall be guilty before the court; and whoever says to his brother, 'You good-for-nothing,' shall be guilty before the supreme court; and whoever says, 'You fool,' shall be guilty enough to go into the fiery hell. [23] "Therefore if you are presenting your offering at the altar, and there remember that your brother has something against you, [24] leave your offering there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother, and then come and present your offering." Matthew 5:21-24

"Everyone who hates his brother is a murderer; and you know that no murderer has eternal life abiding in him." 1 John 3:15


